AT THE DIVINE LITURGY TODAY...

Paul tells the Ephesians to exemplify unity and harmony among themselves because God is our common Father. This idea then is epitomized in the Parable of the Good Samaritan as Jesus exhorts us to exhibit love and concern for our neighbor – our fellow human being – who is anyone whom we encounter in our daily lives. When we demonstrate such practical sympathy, we truly imitate Christ, and we recognize His divine image in the lowliest of people.

Ephesians 4: 1-6

Brethren: I plead with you, then, as a prisoner for the Lord, to live a life worthy of the e calling you have received, with perfect humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another lovingly. Make every effort to preserve the unity which has the Spirit as its origin and peace as its binding force. There is but one body ad one Spirit, just as there is but one hope given all of you by your call. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all, and works through all, and is in all.

----- In this section of his letter written to the Christian community at Ephesus, the Holy Apostle Paul asserts that Jesus' followers always should be at unity and in harmony with each other because they all have the same Father – God the Father in heaven. They therefore must accept life and its various consequences with humility and patience, making allowances for the faults of one's neighbors. It is precisely when we can exhibit this type of understanding and show such practical sympathy towards others that we indeed do demonstrate true Christian charity, which translates into love and concern for our neighbor. Paul tells the Ephesians to be at one with God first, and then inevitably they will be at peace, harmony, and unity with each other. True-believing Christian people belong to one body – the Body of Jesus Christ (which is the Church) – and there is but one Spirit that animates and vivifies this Body: the Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL Luke 13: 10-17

He was teaching in a synagogue on the sabbath. And a woman was there who for eighteen years had been crippled by a spirit; she was bent over, completely incapable of standing erect. When Jesus saw her, he called to her and said, "Woman, you are set free of your infirmity." He laid his hands on her, and she at once stood up straight and glorified God. But the leader of the synagogue, indignant that Jesus had cured on the sabbath, said to the crowd in reply, "There are six days when work should be done. Come on those days to be cured, not on the sabbath day." The Lord said to him in reply, "Hypocrites! Does not each one of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his ass from the manger and lead it out for watering? This daughter of Abraham, whom Satan has bound for eighteen years now, ought she not to have been set free on the sabbath day from this bondage?" When he said this, all his adversaries were humiliated; and the whole crowd rejoiced at all the splendid deeds done by him.

-----Today's holy gospel lesson portrays for us an incident wherein Jesus showed compassion for a certain crippled woman who had been ill for eighteen years. The Holy Evangelist Luke indicates that this hapless woman was ailing from a sickness caused by spiritual and psychological elements rather than by something organic and physical. As Jesus laid His hand upon this suffering woman, we can perceive the tremendous Power of the Lord in operation against the legions of evil. He demonstrated that His authority and mastery are supreme over such adverse forces that exist in the world. Although the president of the synagogue was annoyed at Jesus' having healed on the Sabbath, our Lord rebuked the assembly as being hypocrites and not being concerned with showing mercy and compassion. Many signs had been predicted for which the Jews were to watch, indicating the Messiah's presence among them. One of these was that the powers of evil would be commanded and controlled. With Jesus' healing authority over malevolent forces, salvation truly was at hand! Many, however, were so insular and hard-hearted that they failed to recognize it.

Please pray for the causes of our four Saintly Bishops and ask them to intercede for your specific intentions: O Almighty God, our Lord, we bless You, we praise You, and we thank you for all the graces which You, in Your infinite mercy have bestowed upon us. We are especially grateful for giving us four saintly and heroic Bishops: Bishop Theodore G. Romzha, Bishop Paul P. Gojdich OBSM, Bishop Basil Hopko, and Bishop Alexander Chira, who, by their courage, charity, and intrepid faith, inspired our Ruthenian people in the darkest moments of their history. By their great sufferings, humiliating imprisonment, and violent death they gave living witness to their Catholic faith and glorified Your exalted name. Therefore, O Gracious Lord, glorify them in return by Your divine power and inscribe their names in the book of Your Saints. For you are holy, our God, and we render glory to You, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and ever, and forever, Amen.
