EPISTLE: Ephesian 5: 9-19

For light produces every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth. Try to learn what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the fruitless works of darkness; rather expose them, for it is shameful even to mention the things done by them in secret; but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore, it says: "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light." Watch carefully then how you live, not as foolish persons but as wise, making the most of the opportunity, because the days are evil. Therefore, do not continue in ignorance, but try to understand what is the will of the Lord. And do not get drunk on wine, in which lies debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another [in] psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and playing to the Lord in your hearts

GOSPEL: Luke 17: 12-19

As he was entering a village, ten lepers met [him]. They stood at a distance from him and raised their voice, saying, "Jesus, Master! Have pity on us!" And when he saw them, he said, "Go show yourselves to the priests." As they were going, they were cleansed. And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. He was a Samaritan. Jesus said in reply, "Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?" Then he said to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

SAINT OF THE DAY: Our holy father Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, who on April 4th, on the holy night of Pascha, fell asleep in the Lord. His memory is celebrated today, on which (while still a catechumen) he undertook ruling the famous See of Milan in 373, while he was exercising the office of prefect of the city. A true pastor and teacher of the faithful, he exercised great charity toward all, defended strenuously the freedom of the Church and the doctrine of orthodox faith against the Arians. By his commentaries and his musical hymns, he piously catechized the people. (397)

The Maternity of Holy Anna who with her husband, St. Joachim, miraculously conceived our Blessed Mother in the manner of the natural course of husband and wife even in their old age and in spite of Anna's perceived barrenness. According to tradition, the two had prayed separately for the gift of a child, promising to commit the child to God. After each being overshadowed by Divine favor, the two came together and conceived their only child, the Theotokos and ever-virgin Mary. It is said that no carnal passion was present with Ss. Joachim and Anna upon Mary's conception, leading some to refer to this feast as the "Dispassionate Conception." In the Western Churches, this feast is known as the feast of the Immaculate Conception, because of the notion that no sin was present at any point in the event.

The Theotokos of Guadalupe, who first appeared on Dec. 9, 1591, in Mexico to St. Juan Diego, bestowing on him an icon "not made with human hands," requesting that a church be built in her honor on that mountain. Her shrine there is one of the most celebrated places of pilgrimage in the Americas. Pope John Paul II named her the Patroness of the Americas. Since the feast directly concerns the American context which our particular church finds itself, and the event is consistent in the ancient Christian tradition of the miraculous **Acheiropoieta** (Icons not made with human hands), our American Ruthenian Byzantine Catholic Church holds the unique distinction of being the only Eastern Catholic Church to formally commemorate this feast on our Liturgical calendars.
