EPISTLE: Ephesians 2: 14-22

For he is our peace, he who made both one and broke down the dividing wall of enmity, through his flesh, abolishing the law with its commandments and legal claims, that he might create in himself one new person in place of the two, thus establishing peace, and might reconcile both with God, in one body, through the cross, putting that enmity to death by it. He came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near, for through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father. So, then you are no longer strangers and sojourners, but you are fellow citizens with the holy ones and members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the capstone. Through him the whole structure is held together and grows into a temple sacred in the Lord; in him you also are being built together into a dwelling place of God in the Spirit.¹

GOSPEL: Luke 12: 16-21

Then he told them a parable. "There was a rich man whose land produced a bountiful harvest. He asked himself, 'What shall I do, for I do not have space to store my harvest?' And he said, 'This is what I shall do: I shall tear down my barns and build larger ones. There I shall store all my grain and other goods and I shall say to myself, "Now as for you, you have so many good things stored up for many years, rest, eat, drink, be merry!" But God said to him, 'You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?' Thus, will it be for the one who stores up treasure for himself but is not rich in what matters to God."

<u>SAINT OF THE DAY:</u> Our holy fathers Amphilocius, bishop of Iconium, in Lycaonia, who, a companion of Saints Basil and Gregory of Nazianzus in the desert and a colleague in the episcopate, famous for his holiness and teaching, underwent many trials for the Catholic faith (395) and **Gregory**, bishop of Agrigento, a great wonderworker and bishop who took part in the Fifth Ecumenical Council at Constantinople in 553. (7th century)

THANKSGIVING DAY: Celebrations of Thanksgiving have been given by local communities in North America as far back as 1619. The day was first celebrated as a national day of thanksgiving on November 26, 1789 by the first President of the United States, George Washington. It was formally codified as a national holiday by the 16th President, Abraham Lincoln, in 1863 and firmly established to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November in 1939 by the 32nd President, Franklin Deleno Roosavelt. For Apostolic Christian Communities, every offering of the Divine Liturgy is a commemoration of thanksgiving. This is not in the sense of thankfulness for the land we live in or the nation to which we are legally ascribed while on this side of creation, but a thanksgiving for the eternal sacrifice which Christ has made for us on the Cross, thanksgiving for the gift of His Body and Blood, and thanksgiving for being brought into communion and fellowship with God. The very word for Eucharist in even modern Greek is ευχαριστώ, which means "I thank you". As we are gathered around our tables with family and friends for this civil holiday, giving thanks for the stability and prosperity of the earthly nation which we find ourselves, let us also remember our first allegiance to the Kingdom of God, and our citizenship in that true Christian Nation of the Church established by Christ. Let us never forget the sacrifice of Christ and His Saints, and the good things which God has given us, continues to give us, and which are deigned to come in their proper time. Glory to Jesus Christ!
